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DEW CONSTRUCTION

WINDHAM SCHOOL DISTRICT, SAU #95

CHAIRMAN'S AWARD

The 2020 Chairman Award goes to DEW Construction and the Windham School District renovation.

The project, which nearly doubled the existing square footage of Golden Brook School, was constructed in three phases over two years beginning in August 2017. DEW had one year to complete 40,000 square feet of the affected gross area during Phase I and less than 11 months to complete Phase II, which was nearly 100,000 square feet. Phase III, the renovation at the middle school, was completed over the summer of 2019.

DEW's ability to honor the tight schedule and deadline while maintaining a high standard of work was no small feat. Project hours were a minimum of 14 hours per day, seven days a week.

Daily meetings with school officials were held to coordinate student and staff activity and movement to ensure the safety of all. There was also routine communication with local police and fire departments on safety and security measures. Every field employee and subcontractor had to pass a thorough security check prior to being allowed onsite.

Separation barriers between the operational school and the construction zone ensured the schools could remain operational and safe with minimal disruptions. DEW also had to maintain the existing traffic flow until a new loop road was built and provide adequate parking for the operational school and construction employees.

DEW Superintendent Dan Riley saw the project as an opportunity to contribute to student learning. He led a monthly assembly and provided opportunities for the community and student body to learn more about how the ongoing building construction related to their Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts and Mathematics (STEAM) curriculum.

The pre-planning, logistics, and coordination that were required to ensure a safe environment and adhere to the agreed-upon schedule and budget were spot on. Despite the project breaking ground six weeks later than scheduled, because of property closing delays, all three Phases of the project were completed on time. Not only was the budget met, but the project was completed nearly \$1 million under budget.



PROCON

AC Hotel by Marriott (Design-Build)

EXCELLENCE AWARD

The AC Hotel by Marriott and The Envio event center located in Portsmouth, New Hampshire opened in 2019, providing modern accommodations for tourists and business travelers to the historic seacoast community. The design-build hotel constructed by PROCON sits on a piece of land once used by early shipbuilders and its design elements pay homage to years gone-by while transforming an unsightly parking lot into a showpiece.

The 152,000 square foot, 5-story hotel has 156 deluxe guest rooms and a 4,500 square foot event space named The Envio. There are two media salons with collaborative technology, a board room, and a 1,350 square foot sub-dividable conference area located on the first floor. An additional 2,335 square foot of leasable office and retail space is available on the ground floor with a parking garage for 110 vehicles. Perched atop the AC Hotel on a raised roof terrace is The Rooftop at Envio, Portsmouth's newest restaurant and bar which offers indoor and outdoor seating with panoramic views of the Piscatagua River.

The hotel is located within the City of Portsmouth's Historic District Commission. This required PROCON to carefully articulate the building design to meet the existing character of its location. The design process took several months longer as PROCON carefully adjusted the exterior design to meet the restrictions set by the City. It took 5 hearings with the Historic District Commission followed by 9 amendments to the design to receive final approval.

PROCON mitigated unforeseen conditions on the site while digging for footings and finding wharfs that have been in place for hundreds of years that needed to be re-

The PROCON team had to work around a City's Sewer Improvement project that surrounded the hotel project for weeks beyond the expected timeline, all while maintain-

While planning the construction of the hotel project, space constraint was a major concern as the building footprint was the same size as the site. The team had to manage difficult space constraints by pre-planning material handling and laydown areas and by securing one-way street access from the City of Portsmouth.

Once the first-floor podium and parking deck was put-in-place, a 154 foot self-erecting crane was brought into the space to complete construction of the remaining floors. A tower crane with a 138 foot boom length was brought in to pick the working crane up and over the building to remove it from the site.

Amid construction, the owner changed the scope of the project by adding The Rooftop at Envio, a restaurant and bar with an outdoor deck. The addition required many changes to the interior of the hotel after the space was constructed. The AC Hotel by Marriott was constructed with multiple design changes utilizing PROCON's seamless design-build method.

The new 5-story, upscale AC Hotel by Marriott Portsmouth opened in February 2020 in the city's rapidly developing North End.

SULLIVAN CONSTRUCTION

Catholic Medical Center Vein & Viscose Specialties

MERIT AWARD

Catholic Medical Center's new state-of-the art Vein and Vascular Specialists facility in Bedford, NH offers convenient, outpatient treatment for a range of conditions. CMC partnered with Lavallee Brensinger Architects and Sullivan Construction on the 12,000 square foot facility which opened in April

The space was a part of an existing building which was completely gutted on the inside. The architect created a design which met the needs of the client in terms of providing a welcoming, healing environment for patients and Sullivan completed all the fit up according to those plans. In the procedure rooms, selected materials and finishes for walls and flooring were chosen based on their aesthetics to clean and maintain surfaces easily. Specialty systems included HVAC, medical gas and electrical. Highly effective LED lighting was used throughout the project resulting in energy efficiency and sustainable material usage

The building was an older structure and posed challenges prior to the start of construction. The underground piping was corroded in several spots

and needed to be identified and repaired. The exterior of the building was leaking and had to be sealed and the HVAC equipment was located on the roof while a functioning healthcare facility operated on the second floor.

The greatest challenge involved the exterior of the building which was extremely wet because it wasn't sealed properly. This caused a three week delay in production. As the landlord sealed the building, Sullivan Construction was constantly running dehumidifiers and air handlers to continue working.

Sullivan project managers coordinated with architects, subcontractors and engineers, to determine timing and space needs. The project took a total of 7 months to complete and was done on time, within budget, and with no reportable injuries.

Sullivan Construction delivered a space for the CMC Vein and Vascular Specialists facility in which the community can feel comfortable, safe and healed.





ATLANTIC PREFAB

All American Assisted Living

MERIT AWARD

All American Assisted Living at Kingston is a residential community located in southern New Hampshire and designed for active seniors. This impressive 60,000 square foot community includes apartments, recreational areas, and medical services in an atmosphere that feels like home.

Atlantic Prefab was pleased to take part in this unique community through their affiliation with Metro Walls who was awarded the framing and drywall contract. Atlantic Prefab supplied not only the panelized structural wall system but also the highly intricate roof truss system, the parallel chord floor truss system, loose shipped joist and rafter materials. Essentially, Atlantic Prefab was responsible for the building's entire structural shell with the exception of some miscellaneous red iron.

The bidding process for the project took almost two years. When Atlantic Prefab was finally awarded the contract, they had several other active projects and needed to be creative in order to squeeze in this large project. With careful planning and the help of subcontracted additional labor, they were able to meet the schedule.

A mid-production change to the rough openings for the interior load-bearing walls posed a challenge. The rough opening sizes originally provided by the general contractor had not included the allowance for wood blocking within the openings. Partway through production, the change was made to require this wood blocking. This change prompted a recall and revision of all previously completed shop drawings.

The interior doors needed to be delivered to the job site by a particular date however the building nor the site were ready. Atlantic Prefab was able to provide a competitive off-site storage solution and later delivered the doors to the site on an as-needed basis.

The originally designed pump house for the project lagged due to planning board approvals and changes in construction materials and requirements. Atlantic Prefab worked with the general contractor to provide a panelized approach to the pump house utilizing cold-formed steel wall panels with sheathing as well as the parallel chord roof trusses.

By committing to prefabrication and off-site construction, the completed project was delivered approximately three months early, welcoming residents to a beautiful new community at The All American Assisted Living at Kingston.

ECKMAN CONSTRUCTION

The Derryfield School Athletic & Wellness Center/Science & Innovation Center (Design-Build)

EXCELLENCE AWARD

The Derryfield School, located in Manchester, NH, is a private school for students in grades six through twelve. In 2015, the Derryfield community determined that indoor athletic and science facilities upgrades were needed to keep pace with the school's growth.

Eckman Construction was selected for the project, which began with a three year fundraising campaign. Eckman was a true partner, providing marketing assistance, donor stewardship with construction tours, and presentations at school-wide assemblies to help build excitement for the project.

The design-build project began in summer 2019 and included a standalone 42,000 square-foot Athletic & Wellness Center, and the adaptive reuse of an existing 10,000 square-foot gymnasium into a Science and Innovation Center. The project was delivered in 17 months, on-time and under budget and with no recordable injuries.

The new Athletic & Wellness Center houses three basketball courts, a weight room, a cardio room, locker rooms, and offices. The project involved removing approximately 30,000 cubic yards of fill, constructing an access road, and relocating utilities throughout campus.

Construction of the Athletic and Wellness Center allowed Derryfield to transform its old gymnasium into a new Science and Innovation Center. The new space serves as an incubator for innovation, creativity and exploration and includes three wet labs, two dry labs, a makerspace, robotics lab, inspiration lounge and an audio/video production studio.

Construction took place while school was in session, so temporary partitions were installed to create a secure buffer from the school's students, staff, and daily operations.

Background checks were performed on all employees of all subcontractors prior to beginning

getting power, sewer, and water service to the new building site was quite an undertaking. The project also required extensive stormwater drainage improvements and an unplanned replacement of a 36" diameter drainage line which failed in an area outside of the construction zone. Onsite crews were able to respond to this emergency immediately. The old drainage line was located and required a specialized excavator to reach the bottom of excavation. After three weeks of careful work in the dead of winter, the rotted drainage line was safely replaced, and the park-

their work on campus. The existing campus infrastructure was not designed to support a building of this size, and ing lot was repaired before any storm events could further complicate the work.

This project was a true design-build project from concept to completion. The Eckman team assumed responsibility for translating the Derryfield community's visionfor two distinct projects into high-quality spaces that will meet the needs of the school for decades to come.

EXCELLENCE

CIANBRO

ECU Module Project, The Shell Chemical Appalachia Project (Industrial/Manufacturing)

EXCELLENCE AWARD

In June 2016, Shell Chemical Appalachia LLC made the final investment decision to build a major petrochemicals plant on the banks of the Ohio River near Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The plant would consist of an ethylene cracker with a polyethylene derivatives unit.

Cianbro Industrial Group was selected for the project because of their safety record, the client's past positive experience working with them, and the quality of the Cianbro module vard in Brewer. Maine.

Each of the 7 furnaces Cianbro built consisted of 8 individual modules along with 4 stair tower modules. Work in the module yard took place year round, over an 18 month period that included some considerably harsh winter conditions. The work included structural steel erection, pipe assembly, hydrostatic and pneumatic testing, electrical, instrumentation, insulation, and coatings.

Cianbro faced several unique challenges including material procurement, significant scope growth and build schedule resequencing, all of which required working hand-in-hand with the client to overcome. As material needs and construction scope grew and changed, the team enlisted the help of several other

groups within The Cianbro Companies.

Skilled craftspeople from as far away as Texas and the Midwest joined local Cianbro resources and subcontractors to increase production and address the client's needs.

Cianbro Fabrication and Coating Corporation took on a portion of the new work. By moving a portion of the scope off-site, the project team was able to focus largely on the original scope while their fabrication team in Pittsfield, Maine worked in parallel to reduce the schedule impact and meet the high demands of the project.

Cianbro worked approximately 837,000 work hours not including 560,000 work hours performed by a Cianbro subsidiary, Starcon, as well as Northeastern Insulation Services (NIS), Northeastern Scaffolding Services (NSS), and other subcontractors.

In November, 2019, the completed modules were loaded onto barges with heavy haul transporters and fastened in place onto load spreaders and sea-fastening systems to endure the nearly 40 day ocean transport down the east coast, up the Mississippi and Ohio Rivers to their final delivery point at the new plant in Monaca, Pennsylvania.

ATLANTIC PREFAB

Portsmouth Medical Park

EXCELLENCE AWARD

The newly built 65,000 square foot Portsmouth Medical Park sits adjacent to the Jackson Gray medical facility and only steps away from the Portsmouth Regional Hospital.

Procon was awarded the job as general contractor as well as providing the architectural and structural engineering service. Metro Walls was awarded the drywall and framing, and in turn contracted with Atlantic Prefab to provide exterior envelope panels that consisted of framing, sheathing and a weather barrier.

Procon knew they would be able to tightly control and expedite the dry-in phase of the building by using Exterior Envelope Panels designed and fabricated off-site by Atlantic Prefab.

The modern design styling of the building offered a few unique challenges that needed an innovative approach. Atlantic Prefab was responsible for the complete exterior weather tight shell. This included challenging features such as window rough openings, wrapping the major exterior corners of the building, cable suspended canopies, and large shadow boxes surrounding the large windows on the East & West elevations. All of these areas were tackled with the use of prefabricated components with minimal complication.

The weather barrier requirement was a class "A" non-combustible and non-permeable product. The initial weather barrier product was Sto's non-permeable fluid applied Vapor Seal. However, after additional review it was found that this product did not meet the specification when utilized behind metal panel finishes.

In response, Atlantic Prefab selected an alternative foil faced peel and stick product by Carlisle. This particular product had not been used prior to this project, so Atlantic Prefab worked with the manufacturer to ensure the required details were met and met their specification.

The final typical panel size for this project was very large at 12 feet 4 inches by 44 feet 4 inches. This encompassed three stories in one panel and required an escorted load for delivery. The panels also needed to be tested to ensure they would be able to resist the forces involved when going from a horizontal position to vertical when being installed. The installation of the majority of an elevation was done in just four hours.

Some areas of the structure required that the weather barrier be field applied. An Atlantic Prefab manufacturer trained weather barrier foreman spent a couple of days on-site to complete these tricky areas.

The final reward for the Atlantic Prefab team was in seeing the large panels glide through the air and effortlessly slide into place turning a bare structural frame into the shape of the area's next high-end medical office building. Each installed panel is a symbol of the innovation, risk, commitment and forward thinking that is Atlantic Prefab.





FULCRUM ASSOCIATES

6th District Court | Probate Division, Concord, NH

MERIT AWARD

In 2017 the State of New Hampshire announced it would renovate the Merrimack County Probate Court in Concord, NH in preparation for a high-profile, highly publicized case. Fulcrum Associates was selected to manage the construction project.

Formerly having housed the Administrative Office of the Courts, the original two-story, wood-framed building needed to be repurposed to support the Probate Court's functions, enable a current day working environment, capture energy efficiencies, and embody the prestigious character you would expect to find in a court of law.

The 8,400 square foot of interior work included renovations to the attic and the majority of the second floor, as well as creation of a new interior staircase. New ceilings, carpet and tile flooring were installed throughout the entire building and all mechanical, electrical and sprinkler systems were replaced or upgraded. Exterior renovations included the removal and replacement of shingles and flashing, a new granite sign, minor landscaping and two new flagpoles with spotlights. They also managed the removal, safe storage, and reinstallation of stained glass panels made by a local artist. Fulcrum had no recordable injuries during the project.

The courtroom and lobby included a full-height wood wall panel system and wood inlay for the acoustical ceilings, all of which was created by a local New Hampshire woodworker. The design also included reuse of wooden pews sourced from the Probate Court's previous courtroom.

Unanticipated challenges included the deteriorating condition of the roof which needed to be repaired. The roof truss system also needed to be modified to fit new equipment into the space. As roof work was underway, it became apparent that significant structural modification was needed to accommodate the increased building load. Upgrades to the subfloor were required to provide proper support throughout the building.

The duct work installation also proved challenging as it was more complex than initially thought and required a unique configuration and installation.

Another unforeseen challenge occurred in the basement with the relocation of a bathroom. Historical documents did not accurately reflect the location of the sanitary line. As work continued in search of the pipe, they found the slab was compromised with loose granular sand shifting underneath. The Fulcrum team addressed the issue of the sanitary line, and once that was remedied, they

introduced "flowable fill" into the cavity to regain the structural integrity of the slab.

Considering the unforeseen conditions and challenges, the Fulcrum team proudly completed the project ahead of the occupancy requirement outlined by the State of New Hampshire. The Court began to move their staff in late November of 2018, and they were ready for the media attention brought on by their first legal case. The introduction of modern design and building systems refreshed the outdated building and enabled the Court to have a new home where they could conduct their business efficiently and effectively.

EXTERIOR DESIGNS

The Pioneer

EXCELLENCE AWARD

The Pioneer is an apartment community in Everett, Massachusetts offering a unique and beautiful design. The massive 286-unit building includes apartments in nearly 50 different layouts.

Plumb House was awarded the project and they in-turn selected Exterior Designs to install the siding materials. The Pioneer is situated in a high traffic area of Everett and needed to have eye-catching curb appeal. The plans called for high-end metal siding, and bright accent portals at the main entrances.

Facing the busy Parkway, the building has rustic and traditional facades with a modern and polished look. The sophisticated red aluminum composite metal entry draws your attention to the building's entrance. The polished cement floors, modern fixtures, and art decor provide a modern touch expected in the current market.

Challenges in custom material procurement required that Exterior Designs start from the top down and tie the project together. They tripled their manpower and had three separate crews installing multiple facades on different portions of the building simultaneously.


The project location in the heart of a busy city made for an incredibly tight job site, requiring strategic planning for equipment placement and material allocation.

A last-minute, unforeseen tie-in detail was discovered on each of the unit's balconies requiring Exterior Designs to create a design solution to properly mitigate potential water issues. They worked quickly to provide multiple design options to be approved by the architect.

The crew worked in and around high rainfall and winds, snowstorms, flooding, and freezing of the courtyards. With the project being on a tight site, the crew often had to hand shovel snow and ice to keep working. Mud flooding and freezing were all significant challenges endured to stay on schedule. Despite these challenges, there were no recordable injuries.

No expense was spared in the design and quality of materials used for this building. The owners of The Pioneer set out to build a unique, yet modern community with a look that was both rustic and contemporary. Exterior Design's work on the stylish exterior exceeded the owner's expectations on both look and quality.





REARCH COMPANY

Burlington Emergency & Veterinary Specialists (BEVS)

EXCELLENCE AWARD

Burlington Emergency & Veterinary Specialists has been the premier emergency veterinary center in northern Vermont for over 10 years.

The Center's previous location was only 5,500 square feet and did not meet the veterinary medical needs of the community. In 2017 the owners decided to move forward with construction of a new facility and chose ReArch Company as the builders

The new facility tripled the size of their existing practice and allows the veterinary team to have all specialty veterinary services under one roof. The new building includes separate suites for rehab, oncology, dentistry, surgery, internal medicine, radiation, CT, MRI, & X-Ray. The new facility also provided ample office space, a staff lounge, on call rooms and a spacious conference room.

The building was designed with a steel superstructure, however the front reception and main entry were designed with Douglas fir timber frame assembly. The exterior walls were framed with wood members but all interior framing was cold formed metal framing.

The new veterinary facility required epoxy flooring throughout the majority of the medical space. During epoxy flooring installation, no other trades could be in the same areas for nearly two weeks. ReArch divided the epoxy flooring scope into five separate phases to allow work to continue in other areas simultaneously.

Mobilizing the major imaging equipment into the new space required some redesign of MEP systems and shielding package. A crane was used to rig both large pieces of equipment into the finished space.

ReArch worked hand in hand with Efficiency Vermont to review the building systems, equipment specifications, and possible incentives. A photovoltaic array was installed on the roof to help offset energy cost. Low VOC materials were specified and provided on the job. The project was designed to be as sustainable and as efficient as possible.

A late decision to add an MRI suite to the project caused delays. Once the decision was made to proceed, the equipment needed to be procured and then the MRI suite fully designed.

This new, state of the art project is Vermont's first and only Emergency Animal Hospital. From expert emergency and critical care 24 hours a day to advanced veterinary specialty and referral services, Burlington Emergency & Veterinary Specialists is both sustainably built and aesthetically pleasing. The new building allows them to continue providing a superior level of care.

ATLANTIC PREFAB

Garrahy Courthouse Parking Garage

MERIT AWARD

The Garrahy Courthouse Parking Garage is adjacent to the Garrahy Judicial Complex on Dorrance Street in downtown Providence, Rhode Island.

The seven level parking garage with first floor retail space was a publicly bid job. Merit-shop Atlantic Prefab was approached during the bidding phase to provide a value-engineered, prefabricated exterior framing approach.

The construction documents called for vertical aluminum truss frames to be installed over the parking garage's precast concrete walls as a subframe for sheathing and exterior finish build-out. Atlantic Prefab's approach was a more cost-effective, cold-formed steel truss system that would be installed by the project's drywall and framing subcontractor.

The new parking garage was a high-profile public project adjacent to the Garrahy Courthouse, making the architectural impact on the surrounding area crucial. The pronounced profile of the high-end finishes depended on the flexibility of Atlantic Prefab's supplied system.

The entire project was unique due to the trusses being vertically rather than horizontally orientated. The vertical orientation in some locations of the building

were as tall as 75 feet. This meant that the trusses built in 24 foot sections needed to have a means of attachment to each other as well as needing to share connection points at the steel embed plates. At heights of 75 feet, the installation needed to be buildable while also being safe and efficient for the installers.

Atlantic Prefab was also responsible for the connection of the trusses to the embed plates that were preinstalled in the precast concrete walls. Design resources were needed far in advance and outside of the typical process and schedule which resulted in many hours of weekend work.

A challenge with any truss project is transporting materials to the site. The first delivery was a fully loaded 48 foot trailer with trusses packaged in groups of ten loaded to ensure safe and efficient unloading by the installer on-site. The general contractor was concerned about their team's ability to safely unload the trusses, so all subsequent loads needed to be delivered with a smaller truck and trailer.

Fabrication and delivery schedule were a moving target. When the final installation schedule was provided, Atlantic's design resources were booked. Through time crunching and weekend work they were able to finalize all of the required production documentation in time to meet the client's schedule and deliver the materials required to complete the Garrahy Courthouse Parking Garage.



ECKMAN CONSTRUCTION

Cohen Center for Holocaust & Genocide Studies, Keene State College

EXCELLENCE AWARD

In 2018, New Hampshire's Keene State College broke ground on an 8,000 square-foot addition to the Mason Library, The Cohen Center for Holocaust and Genocide Studies.

The Cohen Center was designed by Perry Dean Rogers & Partners Architects and Eckman Construction was selected as the construction manager.

Keene State is the only institution in America that offers an undergraduate degree in Holocaust and Genocide Studies, and the Cohen Center is one of the oldest Holocaust research programs in the country.

The Cohen Center features a gallery, classrooms, offices, and an auditorium. A Jerusalem-inspired brick veneer compliments the dramatic design of the addition and distinguishes the new home for the Cohen Center from the standard red-brick façade commonly found throughout campus.

Construction took place in the most heavily trafficked pedestrian route on campus.

A secure buffer was created around the worksite, including fencing along the outer exterior boundaries and temporary walls within the library boundaries. While managing a constrained site on an occupied campus, no safety incidents were recorded.

Eckman Construction's professionalism and excellent communication with the client overcame the logistical challenge of working within an occupied, student-centered, quiet library building - one that is a key campus destination. Demolition work – including removal of masonry and use of temporary supports – had to be surgical and well-timed, in relation to the academic calendar and even calibrated to the daily rhythm of library occupancy. Noise and vibrations were major impacts that were managed with great care and sensitivity.

Deciding on the right brick for the Cohen Center took longer than the schedule had anticipated, due to multiple rounds of mockups. The Eckman Construction team understood that getting it right was paramount and worked diligently and patiently with the design team and donor to test multiple iterations.

The selected design required 25 different shapes of brick and a total of 42,165 bricks were used in the project, with 5% of them angled out on all of the smooth elevations.

To ensure proper installation, GW Pynn Masonry used Halfen concealed lintel systems at all windows. These had to be welded to the tube steel and carefully coordinated to ensure they were in the proper position. A Halfen concealed lintel soffit was also used at the entry. This involved a lintel system that attached to 2 tube steels and a steel beam for support. A shoring system was framed and built-out to accomplish this. Again, the placement of the c-channels for the Halfen support was carefully coordinated for correct placement, which was the most challenging part of the install.

Through design and expert construction management, the project has been widely viewed as a great success and a source of much pride from the Keene community. The overall completed project is a dramatic balance of the college's traditional past and modern present.





Hampton Academy Renovation and Addition MERIT AWARD

Hampton Academy is a K-8 public school located in Hampton, NH, with 400 students and 65 teachers and administrators. The historic building was dedicated in 1939, with additions added to the structure in 1961 and 1974.

In 2017 the town approved a \$25.9 million dollar renovation and addition to the school and selected H.L. Turner architects and Bonnette, Page & Stone as the builder.

Completed in 2019, the original building was fully renovated with a complimentary addition for the students and faculty.

A poorly constructed addition was removed and a new gymnasium was constructed. The existing insufficient, 1939 gymnasium was repurposed into a new auditorium.

In all 17,000 square feet was demolished, 63,000 square feet was constructed, and 67,000 square feet was renovated. All of the remaining existing spaces were fully renovated and updated. Open fields and green space were preserved, and the building was designed to maximize the views of this greenspace and preserve the historic views of the original 1939 school from city streets.


New insulation systems, in conjunction with new mechanical and electrical systems provide an efficient, sustainable, and durable building.

This major renovation and addition project included a two-year construction period, during which cost and labor demand was at its peak. Through careful planning and communication, Bonnette, Page & Stone builders were able to keep labor and material costs within budget.

Construction occurred while the school was still in session. Safety of the students was paramount, and the project team worked to develop a fluid phasing plan to coordinate with teachers, Police, Fire, Select Board, School Board to ensure any changes were documented and communicated effectively.

Through excellent communication and cooperation by the school, design team, construction manager and subcontractors, the project was able to stay on time, on budget, and without incident or interruption to the children's education.

Bonnette, Page & Stone builders delivered a modern design for an historic school that will serve the Hampton community for years to come.



NORTH BRANCH CONSTRUCTION

Private Lakeside Residence, Sunapee, NH

EXCELLENCE AWARD

A new private lakeside residence in Sunapee, New Hampshire is an impressive vacation home built by North Branch Construction.

This new contemporary-style multi-level home was designed to showcase the view of Lake Sunapee and the surrounding New England landscape. The home features large glass expanses along the lake side of the structure providing stunning lake views and high-end specialty finishes on the interior.

The new 5,907 square foot vacation home was built after demolition of an existing 1970's-era home on the lot. The total contract value was over \$3.8 million dollars.

The home's unique design includes exposed beam wood ceilings, an openplank stairway to the second floor, and a large stone fireplace. A new product called Warmboard, a structural subfloor and radiant panel all-in-one system, was used for the installation of the radiant heat flooring. The product allows for the use of low water temperatures which decrease energy use and expense.

The project began in the fall of 2017 with work continuing through the winter. Prior to demolition, Habitat for Humanity was called to salvage fixtures and other materials that could be reused or sold to benefit their organization.

North Branch Construction faced a number of challenges during the project, the most obvious being working during cold winter months on the property which was exposed to the lake on two sides, providing little barrier to wind and cold temperatures. Keeping the roads clear of snow and ice from the steep driveway and access road was important for safety of all working on the project.

Prior to the start of construction, a retaining wall supporting the driveway and entrance road needed to be redesigned and repaired to accommodate the heavy equipment that would navigate the area.

Property setback restrictions resulted in a very tight work site, minimizing areas for work, storage of construction materials, and maneuvering of equipment. North Branch had to rely on just-in-time deliveries and built the house in segments by pouring the foundation in sections.

The unique design of the floating stairway between the first and second floor presented a challenge in finding the proper attachments to safely construct the stairway while maintaining the functional and architectural design elements desired. North Branch worked with the architect and structural engineers to solve the attachment challenge.

The stone mason on the project was short-staffed, which slowed down the project. The masonry crew and North Branch personnel worked extra hours, including weekends, to make up for the staff shortage to finish the project on time.

The stunning private lakeside residence was completed on time in August 2018. The family will enjoy this quality home for years to come.

Tri-K Proteins Plant Relocation

EXCELLENCE AWARD

Tri-K Industries is a manufacturer of specialty ingredients, bringing innovative concepts and products to the cosmetics industry. The company acquired new space in Derry, New Hampshire to relocate their Proteins Division Manufacturing operations from an antiquated building in Salem, New Hampshire.

The relocation included speciality pieces of manufacturing equipment, re-designed piping delivery systems, a modernized process controls system, and new stainless-steel platforms for personnel and equipment.

Northpoint Construction Management was selected to manage this project. Northpoint contracted with DECCO for the project's \$1.5 million dollar process piping systems. DECCO's portion of the work began in July 2019 and was completed in January 2020.

The process piping systems DECCO delivered included vegetable product lines, an animal protein system, product adjustment and packing lines, cooling tower piping, IP charging system, scrubber equipment and piping, filter press system, critical air system and equipment, condensate piping, process water system, and

an effluent piping delivery system.

The DECCO project team was carefully selected to meet the client's demands. Tom Ouellette, a senior process construction supervisor with over 25 years of critical process construction leadership was assigned as the project superintendent. He spent three weeks in the Salem, NH facility watching the process flows, the personnel access challenges, and the equipment maintenance problems with the existing configuration.

Tom worked closely with Northpoint and Tri-K and developed a conceptual plan for the removal of critical process equipment from the old facility and a rigging plan for their re-installation in the new location. He also developed a prefabrication and installation plan for the new piping system.

Once developed, they engaged with DECCOFab for the production support to pre-fabricate 375 piping assemblies in their Brookline, NH facility.

Shutting down, removing, and relocating 12 critical process systems at once while keeping the client productive requires extraordinary planning and precise execution. The DECCO shutdown execution plan was put in place to drive the critical thinking and execution of this challenge. The plan was developed for every process system and each piece of process equipment.

The aggressive schedule and client's need to continually operate sections of their process made the challenge unique. In the end, DECCO's design team reduced the amount of process piping footage from approximately 9,400 feet to 7,500 feet, making for an efficient operation that reduced energy costs and reduced overall project budget.

DECCO successfully minimized the impact of the business relocation while concurrently making process improvements that will increase production to meet their rising market demands.



DEW CONSTRUCTION

WINDHAM SCHOOL DISTRICT, SAU #95

EXCELLENCE AWARD

The community of Windham, NH, experienced a more than 30 percent growth between 2000—2016 resulting in the Windham School District growing overcrowded with a considerable lack of square footage.

In March of 2017, the voters approved a \$38.9 million dollar bond to renovate the Golden Brook School and the Windham Middle School.

The District plan was to nearly double the space. After a competitive interview process, the District hired DEW Construction as their chosen construction manager to bring their vision to a reality.

In August of 2017, construction started on the three-phased project that would be completed over two years.

The renovation of Golden Brook School included a new 37,000 square foot building with classrooms, pre-k education rooms, music rooms, project-based learning rooms, gymnasium, and a 3,000 square foot addition to the kindergarten classrooms. It is now one of the largest Elementary Schools in the state of NH with

capacity for up to 1,200 students.

Upon entering the new 98,000 square foot, two-story Windham Middle School, the lobby features vaulted ceilings, pendant lights and several large windows. Construction included the creation of new learning commons, four new science rooms, family consumer science rooms with five kitchens, special education rooms, and a new engineering lab with 3D printing capability. The project also included the rebuilding of stairs for egress and code issues, building safety corrections to fire ratings and egress components, as well as renovations to bathrooms. Renovating a school while it was occupied with students and faculty presented several challenges for the school population, visitors, as well as the workers involved in the construction.

DEW was in constant communication with the District to coordinate student and staff activity and movement to ensure the safety of all. Daily meetings addressed concerns, mitigated potential problems, and facilitated timely decision-making. DEW worked off-hours to not impact existing facility operations and for the safety of the students.

There was also routine communication with local police and fire departments on safety and security measures. Every field employee and subcontractor needed to go through a fingerprinting process and acceptance prior to being allowed onsite.

The pre-planning, logistics, and coordination that were required to ensure a safe environment and adhere to the agreed-upon schedule and budget were spot on. Despite the project breaking ground six weeks later than scheduled, because of property closing delays, all three Phases of the project were completed on time. Not only was the budget met, but the project was completed nearly \$1 million under budget.

The entire team, Architect, Engineer, the District, and DEW collaborated to ensure this project was a success for all of Windham. The results are modernized and comprehensive school buildings that support innovative, high-quality education, and that meet the District's immediate and future needs.
